The DreamTable Day in late September brought the Rev. Sue Nilson-Kibbey to OUMC. She is the director of the Bishop Bruce Ough Innovation Center at United Theological Seminary in Dayton, OH. The day culminated in a listening session with Council leadership and then with anyone interested from the congregation. All of this, so Sue can glean the common threads which is the vision God is sending us through the breakthrough prayer.

Sue took copious notes as she listened to the congregational response to our ongoing engagement with the breakthrough prayer (see above) which gives us an intentional focus on God's next steps to move OUMC forward with the Spirit's momentum. Leadership awaits Sue's recommendations from her prayerful connection between what she learned in these conversations and potential next steps to continue the movement of our motivations from our heads further into our hearts.

Please continue to FREQUENTLY PRAY the breakthrough prayer in your daily life and LISTEN FOR the God-sized dreams within you individually or for OUMC collectively. Spiritual preparedness is paramount to our openness to what God is up to using us as ambassadors to spread the Good News of Jesus in this world.



Advent can be filled with worry about finding the perfect Christmas gifts. Deep down we want people in our lives to know they are special and that we love them. But sometimes we overlook the greatest gift of all... our very presence. Our spiritual ancestors were also worried- often about survival in the midst of political occupation. And the response of the scriptures is "the Holy Living One is with you." Like a shepherd who never leaves the flock, we are held close. This season, we are invited to be the gift of presence for our loved ones, for our communities, for those who need it most.

November 26 | Being Present with Hope

Our spiritual ancestors cried out in the midst of their political occupations: "Save us!" The idea of a Messiah went hand-in-hand with the need for God to help them in their distress. The Roman occupation of Jesus' time and of the early Christian community is expressed with a sense of waiting, watching, and anticipation of restoration to freedom. All this points to the presence of hope, essential to survival in difficult times. Let us be present with hope to those who need it most.

December 3 | Being Present with Peace

Preparing the way for new beginnings, fresh starts, a clear path, is a classic theme in the faith narrative and in our own lives. Life can contain many 2 chapters. The Good News is that the Holy One is continually making a way for do-overs. In this we can find peace, even when life doesn't feel so peaceful. This week we focus on what it means to be a gift of non-anxious presence for those who need it most.

December 10 | Being Present with Joy The words of the prophet Isaiah offer a prophetic vision that Jesus will also claim in his ministry. Likewise, we are called to claim the gift of being fully present with all people-those who mourn, those who grieve, those who have suffered indignity and oppression. Mary's Magnificat is prophetic as well. She claims the overturning of injustice even before it has come to pass. Joy is not the equivalent of happiness, but rather the deep conviction

that we are called to be present in the work of bringing about "great things"-a better world for those who need it most.

December 17 | Being Present with Love

The faith narrative is careful to show us a lineage from King David to Jesus. It is no ordinary lineage, it is one that began in the shepherding of sheep, of leading and delivering the people in search of a home. Mary's womb becomes part of that lineage of love, offering the world the gift of God's presence "in the flesh." As we enter the story of the birth of Love Among Us, we are invited to be present in love with those that need it most.

December 24 | Christmas Eve: Being Present with Light

It is the night we celebrate the opening of the most precious gift of presence we know-the birth of the Christ Child, the Light of the World. As we light our candles, we open our hearts to becoming part of the gift of light in the world. Like the choice the shepherds faced, will we live in the shadows of fear, or will we dare to run to the manger to know and believe the Good News of new possibility for all who need it most?

December 31 | Sunday after Christmas: Being Present with Assurance

The overwhelming message of the Christmas story is the assurance that we, too, are children of the Holy One. In this, our very presence is a gift if we will only allow the Spirit to move in and through us. Every day of our ordinary lives, we can show up-be

present-and proclaim the assurance of hope, peace, joy, and love to those who need it most.

WHAT IS UNITED METHODIST STUDENT DAY?

United Methodist Student Day was the original Special Sunday founded by United Methodist Church Sunday Schools who collected offerings to help advance education for their children. The fund was originally established in 1872 as the Children's Fund. Today, United Methodist Student Day Sunday has the same purpose, calling upon the denomination to support their students as they prepare for life by adding knowledge to their faith.

Every year, General Board of Higher Education and Ministry awards an average of \$5.5 million in financial aid to United Methodist students. The offering taken on United Methodist Student Day is one opportunity to support these scholarships. Every dollar – **yes 100%** - received goes towards supporting and educating a new generation of principled Christian leaders for the church and the world. Supporting this Special Sunday is truly an investment in our future.

Currently, there are over 70 scholarships available for undergraduate, graduate, or doctoral United Methodist students. Financial support for all General Board of Higher Education and Ministry scholarships come from five primary sources: 63% from endowments; 22% from wills and annuities; 13% from United Methodist Special Sundays and 1% from online gifts and fiduciary income. All donations received empower and encourage our students that we are investing in them and our future. We are blessed to support thousands of students through scholarships, but we would like to do more. Our funds are limited, and every awards cycle we end up with a large pool of qualified candidates who we are unable to help because there was no money left to give. You can help us change that!

Sunshine Girls



FINANCE

A note from Rev. Jason Mahnke, Wisconsin United Methodist Foundation: I started preaching when I was just 18 years old. I was invited by my home pastor to preach, despite my age, because he knew I had a call to the ordained ministry. By the time I was 20, I had preached a whopping three sermons. With my call and this vast amount of experience behind me, I was invited to serve a small, rural congregation in Southeastern Wisconsin as their supply pastor — which basically meant I would visit the members in their homes and preach every Sunday. And so, in November of my junior year of college, I began to preach every Sunday for a congregation of 52 people. As I remember my first year there, I have fond memories of a group of faithful people who had to listen to, probably the worst sermons ever given.

Despite my inexperience, the congregation was very supportive — often offering a tip or an encouraging word. Particularly, I remember one gentleman who came up to me to give me a pat on the back one Sunday morning. After a particularly difficult sermon he said that he truly enjoyed my messages. A little surprised, I responded by simply saying, "Really?" He continued by saying, "Oh yes. You know, you stand up every Sunday and try to tell us about God's love and grace. But what I really like is the fact that, in the whole year you've been preaching, you've never mentioned money once."

Considering that comment, I suppose it could be seen as a bit ironic that my ministry as a part of the Foundation is helping congregations and pastors learn how to comfortably talk about money in relation to our faith (maybe even excitedly). What I've discovered, however, is that talking about stewardship is about focusing love and grace. It is about helping people realize all the ways we are blessed by God, that God has given to us abundantly. God has given us so much, in fact, that we have enough to give generously in love for others.

I encourage you to speak about stewardship boldly. Talk about how you have experienced God's love, grace, and abundance. Share how generosity has transformed your life. Talk about the blessings others have experienced in your church that are made possible by your community's generosity.

OUMC invests funds in the Wisconsin United Methodist Foundation which consistently brings doubledigit returns. We are grateful for their partnership to best steward some of the long-term resources entrusted to our congregation.

Debt Retirement Update by Paul Sampson

My name is Paul Sampson. I have been a member of OUMC for 40 years. I am currently the Stewardship chair. As long as I have been a member, and as long as any of us can recall, we've had long term debt or a church mortgage. We have an opportunity now in the fourth quarter of 2023 to retire that remaining balance of \$64,000.

We have exciting news! Along with the SCRIP committee headed by Mary Koblitz, the annual rummage sale, held in September, Finance, and Memorials, we believe we have \$25,000 to start our campaign to pay down the debt.

We know that God is listening because 10% of that balance has already been raised. We are asking the congregation to do what we did last year with the Heat Up/Clean Up campaign. We had a failed boiler, a dishwasher that needed replacement, and plumbing that had been an issue for many years. We raised that \$45,000 and completed those projects.

We look to you to help us this year to finally end the debt that we've had to budget for for many, many years. We would like to use that money elsewhere and we know that we can. We thank you for your support of the Onalaska United Methodist Church.
